

[B] SWOT Analysis

Strength-

- (1) (i) 95% Staff is well qualified/or faculty.
 - (ii) Four research centres, with Sanskrit as one of the leading research centre having good research facilities in Gwalior division.
 - (iii) Some of the faculty members are well elevated with global reputation.
- (2) It is remarkable for our institution that it has been re-accredited in II cycle by NAAC in B grade (2.71 in 4.00 scale).
- (3) It is a leading educational centre that fulfils the need of more than 4800 students mostly coming from rural background out of which majority belong to weaker section of societies such SC/ST/OBC and minorities.
- (4) It is noteworthy that our institution was certified with Autonomous status in 1995 by UGC.. This status has been continued after inspections carried out by U.G.C. after definite time intervals.
- (5) On infrastructural grounds, at present the institution has ample infrastructure to fulfill the need of students & it is increasing every year with help of Agencies/organization such as U.G.C./ dept. of Higher Education of M.P.

Weaknesses-

- (1) Since it a Govt. Institution & the faculty has been transferred time to time, because of which some odd situation of teaching may be created. This problem is however met with the help of contractual appointments by Jan Bhagidari.
- (2) In Govt. college no. of teaching posts is decided by the states Govt. Our college has been number of sanctioned posts not in appropriate ratio to met with the demands of increasing strength of students
- Our institution is having less number of recognized research centres. More than 65% total teaching faculty is engaged in research activities in different ways such as participation in seminar, carrying research project guiding of research students etc.
- (4) Our institution is having less number of vocational/ certificate courses under self financing scheme.

Opportunity

- (1) To develop in such a way that the institution meet the requirement of increasing strength every year.
- (2) To demand to Department of higher Education, Govt. of M.P. /Janbhagidari for new posts of teaching as well as non-teaching staff as per requirement.
- (3) Datia is a semi –urban place. New & vocational courses/ certificate courses may be designed & implemented for the fulfillment of need of students in this region and to increase the rate of employment. However B.Sc. with Computer Science is getting good response in our institution.

Threats

- (1) Vocational courses implementation under self finance scheme is a problem as students of the Datia district do not feel comfortable with extra fee structure for such courses.
- (2) The procure new area for the College as strength of the students is increasing every year and at present college campus is not sufficient enough to met with the requirement and with the increasing liability.
- (3) Location of institution is another threat. It is far away from the township because of which students especially girls face problem to reach college.

[C] Strategic Plan-

- (1) Enhancement of more basic infrastructural needs such as construction of classroom, more laboratories, renovation and development of existing science labs etc.

- (3) In terms of quality assurance, proper monitoring and increment in the existing quality of institution in different direction.
- (4) Development of well equipped recognized research centres in more department.
- (5) To start more self financing /certificates programmes/courses may be under dual qualification scheme for the benefit of students.
- (6) To enhance the faculty development through various modules i.e. research seminar, Workshop and more research activities.
- (7) To increase existing library and sports facilities for ensuring the all round development of human resource produced by the institution.




Figure 1:- Trend line (Projected) Graph for Student's Strength in the College for next five years based on previous five years [Data in red Font is projected data]

Courses under Self-Financing Scheme in previous five years and projected for the next five years




Figure 2:- Graph and Projected Graph for Courses under self-Financing Scheme and certificate Courses in the College for next five years based on previous five years [Data in red Font and in brown in Graph is projected data]




Figure 3:- Graph and Projected Graph for Infrastructure in the College for next five years based on previous five years [Data in red Font and in green in Graph is projected data]




Figure 4:- Trend line (Projected) Graph for Number of books in the Library for next five years based on previous five years [Data in red Font is projected data]




Figure 5:- Research Scenario of the College [Data in red Font and in brown in Graph is projected data]
