






Figure 1:- Trend line (Projected) Graph for Student's Strength in the College for next five years based on previous five years [Data in red Font is projected data]




Figure 3:- Graph and Projected Graph for Infrastructure in the College for next five years based on previous five years [Data in red Font and in green In Graph is projected data]

<u>Development in the Library during previous years along with projection for next</u> <u>flve years</u>




Figure 4:- Trend line (Projected) Graph for Number of books in the Library for next five years based on previous five years [Data in red Font is projected data]

Research Scenario for the last five years and projected for next five years for the College





Figure 5:- Research Scenario of the College [Data in red Font and in brown in Graph is projected data]

- 9. To pursue and support more teachers for their establishment as recognized supervisor for research of the affiliating university.
- 10 Preparation of the institution for Autonomous inspection/ revision which is due in 2017-18.
- 11. Preparation of our institution for the NAAC accreditation in III rd cycle in the session 2018-19 and it will be tried to have "A" grade this time.
- 12. To improve the institution serving Class -Education instead of mass education.
